








## LENAPE NAMES AT SEASHORE





These are names and photographs of some things found at the seashore where the Lenape once lived. So many names for things have been lost – names like seagull, shark, crab, lobster, and many types of grasses that grow near the shore. It is amazing that the names given below were remembered in Oklahoma many generations since the Lenape lived near the sea.


