

Dear Sir:

I am just in receipt of your letter of June 25, 1946, in which you tell me that you Delaware Cherokee Indians have a deed to 2.7 acres of land located north of Dewey, known as the Williams Cemetery or burial ground for the Delaware Indians.

You also state that Mr. A. Langford of Dewey, Oklahcma, has purchased the land all around this cemetery and has fenced your right-of-way and you do not have access to this cemetery; that he has built a strong fence around your land and closed your cemetery and you cannot get to the cemetery. Of course, I don't know anything about the situation except what you have told me. You say that you have contacted the County Attorney of Washington County as well as the County Commissioners of that county and that they have not afforded you any relief. You asked me to write to the Superintendent of the Five Civilized Tribes at Muskogee. I am doing this today and am herewith enclosing a carbon copy of my letter to the Superintendent, sending your letter along with mine and requesting him to make an investigation of the situation and seeing that your rights are protected.

When I hear anything further on the subject from official sources, I shall be glad to pass this information on to you. I do not know of anything else that I can do for you at this time, but I want you to feel free to call upon me anytime I can render you service.

Dear Sir:

Tam just in receipt of the enclosed letter from Freddie Washington of R.F.D. 1, Wann, Oklahoma, dated June 25, 1946, which I think will be self-explanatory.

You will observe that Mr. Washington states that his people, the Delaware Cherckee Indians of northeastern Oklahoma have a deed to 2.7 acres of land for burial purposes, located north of Dewey, Oklahoma, and that they have been using it for some seventy-five years until recently. They say that Mr. A Langford of Dewey, Oklahoma, has built a strong fence around the cemetery and prevented their having access to the burial grounds.

They have requested that I write you and I sincerely trust that you will have this matter investigated and afford these people all the relief to which they are entitled.

Kindly let me hear from you in the premises at your early convenience, returning Wr. Washington's letter when it shall have served its purpose.

Dear Sir:

This office is in receipt of letter from Honorable George B. Schwabe enclosing a letter to him relative to the obstruction of right-of-way into a Cherokee-Delaware Burial Grounds located north of Dewey, Oklahoma.

The matter has been referred to Mr. T. V. Williams, United States District Indian Agent for Washington County, with the request that he investigate the matter and attempt to secure a solution and it is requested that you contact him at the County Court House in Bartlesville in the afternoon of Thursday, July 25, and give him the facts of the case.

If you have a copy of the original deed you referred to, setting aside this land for burial purposes, please bring that deed with you when you talk with Mr. Williams. A copy of our letter to Mr. Williams is enclosed herewith for your information.

Dear Sira

This office is in receipt of a letter, dated July 13, 1946, from Hon. George B. Schwabe, Member of Congress, First District of Oklahoma, enclosing a letter from Freddie Mashington, Cherokee-Delaware Indian, of Wann, Oklahoma.

Freddie Washington states that the Cherokee-Delaware Indians have a burias ground consisting of 2.7 acres located north of Dewey, known as Williams Cemetery, which has been used by the Cherokee-Delaware Indians for the past seventy-five years for birial purposes and that the tribe has a deed to said land. "man, whose name was not stated, purchased land all around the cemetery and constructed a fence around all of the land, thus fencing in the burial ground and obstructing the right-of-way for the use of the burial ground.

Mr. Washington further stated in his letter to the Congressman that he had taken the matter up with the County attorney, County Commissioners a dother officials of hashington County and had received no satisfaction.

It is requisted that you contact Ur. Freddie Washington and secure the facts as then take up the matter with officials of Washington County and see if an amicable solution of the problem can be secured.

If, after your investigation and conference with the officials of Washington County, you feel that an amicable solution cannot be secured, clease report the matter to this office setting forth the facts in detail, together with your recommendations as to whether or not suit should be instituted by the government to recover the right-of-way and continued use of the cemetery by the Cherokee-Delaware Indians.

Wann, Oklahoma, with the request that he contact you at the court house in Bartlesville on Thursday, July 25th, your next regular day in Washington County.

Dear Sire

On June 28th I discussed with you the matter of having the County Comissioners of "shington County keep open and maintain a right-of-way to which Habington County has title, in the SE SE of section 7-28M-LEE, loading from the section line on the south of section 7, north to a cometary which has been used by the Delaware and Cherokes Tribes of Indians for a great many years, and to which they possess title. You will recall that Mr. O.L. Langiord cans the surrounding land, and that he has fenced off your right-of-way, thus forcing the Indians to detour around his land by a circuitous and sometimes impassable route whemover they wish to go to the cometary. The county attorney advised you in my presence that the county commissioners could open up the road without the necessity of legal process, and you advised no that you would see that it was opened at once. You also talked to Mr. Langford by phone, advising him to open up his fence, either leaving it open at all times or building a cattleguard. When we discussed the matter I advised you that I could see no objection to a cattleguard from the Indians standpoint, providing the county was willing to have it there, but that a gate was objectionable.

This letter is to make our conversation a matter of record, and to reiterate my position as a representative of the Indians that action, if not already taken, be taken at once to secure and maintain access to this cemetary along the deeded right-of-way. Formal complaint has been made by members of the tribes interested.

I will discuss this matter with you again when I am in Bartlesville next week, but I am hoping that action will have been taken in the meantime.

way to this cemetery has not yet been opened. Mr. Langford seems to have made some sort of agreement with the County Commissioners, whereby he is to open a gate on the west side of the cemetery. This is an awful place to get in, and not at all what the deed calls for.

I wish it would be possible for you to come out here personally and see just what the situation is. This is an urgent matter and should be attended at once. The Tribe is to meet at my home on August 17, and we hope that it will be possible for you to be here before that time.

Mr. Langford has recently built a pond near this cemetery, in such a place that any time there is highwater the water would back up and cover a large part of this cemetery. This too should be inspected by you, so that you can see exactly what the situation is. We feel that this will ruin our cemetery, and that Mr. Langford should not be allowed to maintain a pond at this place.

I am sorry to have to trouble you further with this matter, but I do not feel that this will be settled until you see for yourself exactly what the situation is, and until some definite order is made and enforced.

In Re: Delaware Cemetery in Sec. 7, T. 28, R. 13, Washington County.

Dear Sir:

For sometime we have been having troube and controversy over the road to the tract deeded to the Delaware for Cemetery purposes in the land above described.

We have had this matter up with Mr. Williams, the agent, several times, and he apparently thought he had the

matter settled, but this did not prove true.

On Saturday, August 17, 1946, the Tribe held a meeting concerning this matter, and we now ask that you appoint a special day for the Field Agent to come to the home of Minnie Fouts, three miles North of Dewey, and notify us, that members of the tribe may be present and go to the Cemetery and let him view the situation there.

According to our deed the road is to adjoin the cemetery on the south. Now Mr. Tyler has sold the land and the present owner refuses to permit a road in from the south and has changed it to the west end of the demetery, which makes a very bad and difficult entrance at any time

and in wet weather is impassable.

We sincerely trust that you will be able to find a day soon, that the Field Agent may come and that you will notify Mrs. Fouts in time for members of the Tribe to be present. We feel that this matter will not be settled until something definite is done by the Department.
